



Take a look at the cover of the first ever children's book. It was published in Boston, America, in 1656. In 1620, the Pilgrims had arrived in America. The author of this book was a religious leader of the Pilgrims, who had separated from the English church and come to America for religious freedom. The Pilgrims fined people if they did **not** go to church, and if they **did** celebrate Christmas. (They interpreted the Bible strictly, and there is no specific reference to Jesus being born on December 25). They banned fancy clothing, and dancing on Sunday.


