THE LOWDOWN

You probably know that tomorrow is Anzac Day, a time when we remember and honour the bravery of those who fought to protect their homes, families, and values. This year, in the leadup to Anzac Day, Prime Minister Anthony Albanese has been visiting Papua New Guinea (PNG), our neighbour to the north. He is there to remember the Kokoda Campaign, one of the hardest trials Australia faced during World War II.

During the Second World War, Japanese forces tried to take over PNG by capturing the city of Port Moresby, which was under Australian control at the time. The Kokoda Campaign involved fierce fighting in hot, dense jungles and mountainous terrain. Australian and Papuan soldiers worked together to stop the Japanese invasion. Many soldiers lost their lives, and many more were injured, but the spirit of courage, endurance, mateship and sacrifice helped them regain control.

Many Australians now hike the Kokoda Track, a challenging 96-kilometer trail through mountains and jungles, to pay tribute to the heroes of this campaign. Yesterday, Australian Prime Minister Albanese and the Prime Minister of PNG, James Marape, set out to walk a 15-kilometer section of this track. They camped overnight and will finish their journey today at Isurava, a site of intense battle during the campaign.

Tomorrow morning, as the sun rises, both Prime Ministers will attend a dawn service at the memorial in Isurava. They will reflect on the history shared by our two countries and the strong bond that continues today. (BREAK)

Out of an astounding 23,000 applicants to the European Space Agency's training program, Katherine was one of only six who graduated and won their astronaut wings.

While a few Aussies have been astronauts before, they represented other countries. Katherine is our first true-blue Aussie astronaut! And if you're wondering how she stood out from the crowd of applicants, it's not just her skills as an aeronautical engineer. Katherine shines as both a leader and a team player, qualities she honed through playing team sports and volunteering with the State Emergency Service and Surf Life Saving

While Katherine is not on the crew list for any missions yet, she says she would love to go to the moon - but in the meantime she jokes that her certificate "is going straight to the pool room."
