THE LOWDOWN

Whip out your wellies and crack out the brollies. It's going to be a wet weekend, as a 4000km band of cloud settles in over the entire country. Called a north-west cloud band -the massive weather system will dump rain everywhere from Kimberley in north of Western Australia, down to Tassie, with 80 percent of our big ol' country expected to cop a drenching.

Excellent for farmers, who love this sort of consistent rain to help grow their crops - and help break what's been a really dry autumn so far for many parts of the country - not so great for weekend sports playing - as anxious kids and parents all over the country nervously check their phones on Saturday morning to see whether footy, soccer, netball or cricket has been cancelled again.

The north-west cloud band is the first to arrive in Australia this year. And it comes as news arrives this week of a brand new cloud-surveying satellite taking to the skies above our heads - nicknamed the White Dragon.

The White Dragon satellite took off from Earth last week and is now in orbit 400 kilometres above our heads. Its job is to study clouds - and specifically, how different types of clouds help to cool the planet, and which ones tend to warm it up.

The satellite is called Earthcare - because the data it collects will help scientists better understand the impact clouds have on climate change. So very clever ...

What does 'goes to the polls' mean? It means they are having an election - so the country's 27 million voters can decide who leads them. It's super important whenever we come across any information online - be it on YouTube or a news website or TikTok or Instagram - to Stop, Think and Check - before believing it to be true. Thanks Squiz-E - you've done it again!
