THE ESTIDOTIN

China took one giant leap towards putting an astronaut on the Moon yesterday morning when it landed a rocket ship on the far side of the lunar satellite.

The Chang-e 6 rocket touched down on the South Pole of the Moon - marking only the second time a country has successfully landed a spacecraft on the far side of the Moon.

Now that it's there, it will send out a rover to collect samples of Moon dirt and Moon rock, which will be plonked into a small rocket, lift off from the Moon, connect with the larger spacecraft that is spinning around above the Moon - which will then return to Earth to give the Moon dust to scientists down here to examine.

And look - while all of that might sound simple enough - it involves the sort of maths and engineering cleverness that if you look at closely enough will blow your mind.

China is hoping this mission will help it achieve its goal of putting astronauts on the Moon within the next six years.

Back here on Earth - and instead of looking to the stars, Aussie kids are spending more time looking at screens than kids in most other countries. An international study has found that at an average of four hours a day spent on technology, Aussie kids are world leaders in screen time. And it's not necessarily a good thing - with the study finding kids who spend

more than an hour a day on social media or browsing the internet score up to 20 points lower in maths than those who don't. Just sayin' ...

Each day we give the world globe a spin and find a news story from wherever it stops - and today we've landed in the United States, where a 12 year old from Florida has just been crowned the country's new Spelling Bee champion.

Bruhat Soma correctly spelled a staggering 29 words correctly in a 90 second speed spell-off - beating his competitor who could only manage 20 correctly spelled words.

And they weren't just any words ... it's not like he was asked to cat, mat and hat. Words Bruhat was asked to spell included heautophany, nachschläge and puszta ... and look, I can't even pronounce them let alone know what they mean.

Bruhat said afterwards he practiced every day with his dad - searching for and spelling the most obscure words they could find. And for any of you out there thinking: ahhh - that's not a real sport ... Bruhat's having the last laugh - having walked away with \$75,000 in prize money for his efforts. Not bad at all.

Aussie tennis player, Alex De Minaur played the game of his life in Paris yesterday - lifted to victory in an eight hour duel by a kid in the crowd who just wouldn't let him quit.

Managing to crawl back from behind to beat his opponent, the big hitting German, Jann-Lennard Struff - Alex told reporters after a young kid who was courtside in the cold and rain and cheering him on gave him the motivation to just keep fighting.

And now he's launched a search on Instagram to get the lucky charm kid back to watch his match tonight against world number 5 Danill Medvedev. C'mon Demon - you can do this!

The x-ray oven takes a snapshot of the inside of cookies as they bake - and that data will be analysed by food scientists to create the ultimate biccie.
