A long way away - on the coastline of France - a King, lots of dignitaries from many different countries and a handful of very old soldiers will gather to remember a really important day in history.

Today is the 80th anniversary of something called the D-Day Landings. The D-Day Landings were a massive military operation that saw 156,000 soldiers storm the beaches of Normandie - on the French coastline - to try to turn the tide of the Second World War.

Most were troops from the United States, Britain and Canada - but approximately 3,300 soldiers who bravely jumped from boats and made their way up the beaches of Normandie whilst enemy gunfire rained down on them were Australian.

And so today, the King of England, King Charles, his son Prince William, Australia's Governor General John Hurley, French President Emmanuel Macron, US President Joe Biden and Canadian PM, Justin Trudeau will gather at a place called Omaha Beach to remember the important battle.

You know how here in Australia we pause every April 25 to mark Anzac Day - and an important battle that happened in a place called Gallipoli? It's a similar occasion.

And while all of those presidents and prime ministers and kings and princes are all very important - the most important people there today will be the handful of now very old former soldiers who were actually there on the day the D-Day Landings took place .. old men who were once young soldiers who selflessly risked their lives so that we can enjoy the relative peace we have today. The real heroes of D-Day.

SPIN THE GLOBE

Each day we give the world globe a spin and find a news story from wherever it stops .. and today we've landed On the Moon ... so, you know - not exactly on the world globe, but kind of hovering off in orbit around it .. where a Chinese spaceship has become the first ever to collect rocks from the far side of the Moon and is preparing to bring them back to Earth.

So what's the big deal about rocks from the Moon? Well - firstly, as we discussed on Monday's podcast, the Chinese space mission to land on the far side of the Moon is on the second time a country has managed to do that - because we can't see the far - or the dark side of the Moon - it makes it really tricky to land rockets there. And now the Chang-e 6 as the rocket is called, has collected a bunch of rocks and dirt and is making its way back to Earth for scientists to study. Mission almost accomplished.

Why is any of this significant? Because there's something of a space race going on at the moment, between countries of the world like China, India and the United States to see who can get humans back on the

Moon the soonest - and who can build a permanent human base there.

SPORT TIME

It all came unstuck for NSW eight minutes into the State of Origin last night as a high tackle on star Queensland fullback Reece Walsh saw the Blues forced to play one man down for almos the entire match - seeing them lose the first game of the series by 38-10.

In front a huge crowd in Sydney, the Queensland Maroons were just too strong, running off the field with the biggest ever win for a Queensland side in a State of Origin held in Sydney.

The Blues came bursting out of the half-time sheds with a renewed sense of energy and purpose - and for a moment, it seemed as if they might present a challenge.

But finally, it was a largely one-sided affair, including a hat-trick of tries for Dolphins fullback, Hamiso Tabuai-Fidow.

Next stop for the NRL State of Origin circus is Game 2 at Melbourne's MCG in three week's time.
