THE LOWDOWN

Alright, Squiz Kids—hands up if you've ever found a squashed banana peel or a mouldy mandarin at the bottom of your school bag? Yep, me too. Food waste is a big problem—and not just in backpacks (or handbags).

Every year, Australians throw away more than seven million tonnes of food—enough to fill more than 13,000 Olympic-sized swimming pools! That wasted food costs our economy a whopping \$36.6 billion and takes up space in landfills, where it creates methane gas that is 25 times more powerful than carbon dioxide at trapping heat in our atmosphere. All bad.

But in Darwin, an Indigenous-owned business called EcoMob is on a mission to change all that. They take food scraps—stuff that would normally be tossed out—and turn them into nutrient-rich additives for soil to help plants grow. Right now, they're processing three tonnes of food waste a week, keeping thousands of kilos of scraps out of landfills.

And they're only just getting started! EcoMob is also looking at ways to use food waste to feed chickens, ducks, fish, and prawns—and because shipping fertilisers into the Northern Territory is expensive, their work could help farmers and create local jobs too.

So, what can YOU do? Be creative, like EcoMob and maybe start a compost bin at school, or bring more wrapper-free nude food to school. Every little bit helps!

Oh, and maybe clean out your school bag once in a while too!

SPIN THE GLOBE

Each day we give the world globe a spin and find a news story from wherever it stops, and today we've landed in Greece on the stunning island of Santorini—where the ground is shaking like never before.

Thousands of earthquakes have rocked Santorini and nearby islands in what scientists call an "earthquake swarm"—with some quakes happening just minutes apart. Since late January, over 12,800 tremors have been detected, with more than 30 quakes a day above magnitude 4.0. The strongest so far, at magnitude 5.1, was even felt as far afield as Greece's capital city, Athens, the island of Crete, and even in parts of Turkey!

While the shaking has caused rockfalls and minor building damage, experts are closely watching in case this signals something bigger—like a volcanic eruption. Many locals and tourists have already left the island, and Greece has declared a state of emergency that will last until at least March 3, meaning that, amongst other things, schools are closed.

So what happens next? Scientists can't predict earthquakes exactly, but they're keeping a close eye on the situation.

But here's the rub: Puppy Bowl can't be broadcast live—Due to the need for... ahem... toilet timeouts. When nature calls, the game paws-es, and a clean-up crew rushes in like a pit stop team! I said 'pit' people!

Even though the game was thrilling, and yes, there's a link to videos of the coverage in the episode notes, every puppy playing was from a shelter—and by the final whistle, they'd all found forever homes. Now that's a real win!

BELIEVE IT OR NOT

Believe it or not, one of the stinkiest flowers in the world has just bloomed in Canberra—and lucky visitors have said that it smells like a mix of rotting meat, sweaty socks, and bin juice.

It's called the corpse flower, and it only blooms once every seven to ten years. When it does, it releases a gag-worthy stench to attract flies and beetles—the only creatures willing to help pollinate it!

Incredibly, this is Australia's third corpse flower bloom in just three months. One stink bomb went off in Geelong in November, another in Sydney in January (drawing 20,000 curious noses!), and over the weekend, this 1.35m tall flower unfurled in Canberra's Australian National Botanic Gardens.

Scientists don't know why these rare blooms are suddenly appearing, but what we do know is that there are fewer than 1,000 corpse flowers in the world—making this a truly extraordinary (and extra smelly) event! Nature is weird... and wonderful my friends.
