THE LOWDOWN

If I start The Lowdown today with the words "Chicken Jockey", I reckon a lot of you will know exactly what I'm talking about...

Yep — The Minecraft Movie is here — and despite some critics calling it a disaster, it's gone and smashed a record like a pickaxe through stone.

In its opening weekend, the movie raked in a jaw-dropping \$493 million Aussie dollars — more than doubling the record set by The Super Mario Bros. Movie in 2023, making it the biggest video game movie launch ever.

Experts say part of its success is down to how it mimics viral short-form video, with fast-paced action and "clippable moments" — especially a scene featuring Jack Black and a certain surprise entrance dropping into a boxing ring (no spoilers).... And the crowd loses it. Videos of cinema-goers cheering, filming, and posting online have gone viral.

Some adults weren't impressed by the chaos, posting online complaints about the cheering and applause. But for Minecraft fans? Well, let's just say it looks like an epic win.

SPIN THE GLOBE

Each day we give the world globe a spin and find a news story from wherever it stops — and today we've landed waaaay up north, in Alaska, where a group of grizzly bears has been given a job... they're trying to break into rubbish bins

Yep — the Alaska Zoo in Anchorage has teamed up with the state's waste department to test brand-new bins. The goal? To make sure they're tough enough to stand up to a determined bear with a nose for snacks.

So, why's that important? Well, once a bear learns that bins mean food, it can start returning to campsites, neighbourhoods, or rubbish dumps. That's risky for people — and bad news for bears. Bears that get too used to humans or human food can become aggressive, and sometimes have to be put down.

So, even though no bin is totally bear-proof, making them strong and hard to open helps keep bears wild — and people safe.

And yes — I've popped a link to the testing video in your episode notes. It's a mustwatch if you want to see a bear with a bin on its head... or is that just me?

WEIRD SCIENCE

At Squiz Kids, we're big on raising awareness about invasive species — and one of Australia's worst offenders is the toxic, warty, and frankly not-so-cute cane toad. They've been spreading fast across the country, and current control methods — like catching and freezing — are, well... a bit rough. And we're not exactly winning.

But Aussie scientists are on the case — and they've come up with a mind-blowing new approach that could change everything.

Using a technique called gene editing, where scientists carefully change or remove a small part of an animal's instructions for growing, they've stopped cane toad eggs from turning into adult toads. The result? Tadpoles that never grow up, nicknamed "Peter Pan toads", like the boy in the fairy tale.

Even wilder? These super-tadpoles are hungry... gobbling up the eggs of their brothers and sisters and eating three times as many cane toad eggs as normal. And they mostly ignore frog eggs, which is great news for native species.

With over 200 million cane toads in Australia, this new method could help bring the population under control.

Trials in the wild begin later this year — and if it works, it could be a toad-ally clever solution.

POP CULTURE CORNER

If you thought that last story was proper bonkers, you're going to lose the plot over this one...

Once upon a time, it was Aussie and British kids copying American words — like calling lollies "candy" or saying "awesome" and "gotten." But now? It's American kids who are going mad for British slang!

Thanks to the rise of British shows like The Great British Bake Off and Peppa Pig — and let's be honest, the internet — heaps of US teens are picking up words like "queue" instead of "line", calling something "cheeky" instead of silly, and saying "wonky", "nutter", or "dodgy" when things get weird.

The fastest-growing word of all? Bonkers. Which, let's face it, is a bit bonkers in itself.

And, don't forget that Bluey is the reason some American kids are now saying "dunny" instead of bathroom.

So, what Aussie word should we get them saying next? Mozzie? Brolly? Bogan? I reckon trackie dacks deserves its moment in the spotlight.
