SPORT TIME

When I was 14, I was just trying to pass PE without falling over, but at just 14 years of

age, Vaibhav Suryavanshi has smashed one of the fastest centuries ever in the IPL that's the Indian Premier League, one of the world's biggest cricket comps.

Playing for the Rajasthan Royals, Vaibhav scored 100 runs off just 35 balls—the second-fastest century in the league's 18-year history. The pink-clad crowd in Jaipur cheered every boundary like it was the final of the World Cup.

Vaibhav's journey started on a cement pitch laid by his dad in the backyard of their farm in eastern India. At age seven, he was sent to a cricket academy three hours away. He was too small to run between wickets, but coaches saw his talent and local bowlers were brought in from nearby villages just to help him train because he kept wearing them out. His dad even fed them to keep them going, because, he said, "Vaibhav doesn't know when to stop batting!"

Now that's what you call commitment.
