THE LOWDOWN

Forty schools across the NSW Hunter and Mid North regions were closed yesterday after a major flood warning was issued in the face of torrential rains that saw rivers rise and residents evacuated from their homes.

Damaging winds brought down trees and powerlines, with the State Emergency Service receiving more than 2,000 calls for help yesterday morning - while on the coast, huge surf pounded beaches around Port Macquarie causing widespread erosion.

Residents of Taree - on the Manning River in NSW - were told to evacuate their homes yesterday morning as a low-pressure system refused to budge - instead throwing more than 200mm of rain, causing rivers in the area to start to break their banks.

Meanwhile - it was a completely different story half way across the country - as farmers in South Australia started selling off livestock in the face of the worst drought in decades.

A drought is when it doesn't rain for a really long time - and for obvious reasons, that makes farming really difficult.

Rainfall in parts of South Australia, Victoria and Western Australia has been the lowest on record in the past couple of months - forcing farmers there to buy food for their livestock - or in some cases, sell them off.

Many towns are on water restrictions - with reports that water is even being trucked in to parts of the Adelaide Hills to fill up empty water tanks.

Stay safe out there people.

Each day we give the world globe a spin and find a news story from wherever it stops – and today we've landed in Rome - in Italy - again ... as the new Pope continues to make headlines having just delivered his first ever Papal mass.
