# THE LOWDOWN

Here's a question to get your brain cranking on this fine Monday morning...

Does Australia have an inland sea in the middle of the desert in the centre of the country?

Well - usually, no, it doesn't. But right now, it does.

And that's because in a place called Kati Thanda - or Lake Eyre as it was called by Australia's European settlers - rain that fell in Queensland during Cyclone Alfred four months ago has finally made its way across the desert and is filling up a once bone dry, ginormous natural basin. Yes - that's right. The big cyclone that ripped through Brisbane in February and dumped a year's worth of rain on the Queensland outback is still having an effect on the Aussie landscape - transforming what is usually a barren salt flat into a thriving ecosystem.

Shrimp and crustaceans have started to appear in the water, fish numbers have suddenly skyrocketed, tiny marsupials have started to multiply as plants and wildflowers pop up out of the ground as far as the eye can see - and with all this new life has come millions and millions of migratory birds - traveling from as far away as Japan and Russia to feed and to breed.

The result is a place that is usually lifeless has become a bustling, thriving explosion of life - in one of the most incredible transformations the world has ever seen.

# SPIN THE GLOBE

Each day we give the world globe a spin and find a news story from wherever it stops ... and today we've landed in Latvia – which is a tiny country in eastern Europe - on the border with Russia - where maggots are being used by a local council to help process garbage.

If you're eating breakfast - you might want to brace yourself ...

You know how flies are always hanging around garbage bins? That's because they're looking for rotting food to lay their eggs in. When those eggs hatch, they hatch as maggots - teeny tiny little squirmy larvae. Maggots feast on rotting food, helping to break it down.

It's totally gross - but a really important part of the bio-life cycle.

So now a local council in Latvia is breeding flies, which lay about 500 eggs every three weeks, and then sticking the maggots that are laid directly into the food waste that people chuck in their bins.

So the maggots do all the garbage waste processing for the council.

Get this: in the capital of Vilnius, the waste processing plant there breeds flies which produce about three million maggots every month, who, between them, chomp through about 11 tonnes of food waste.

Amazing. And gross. But mostly amazing.

### ANIMAL KINGDOM

Have you ever heard the expression 'a bear with a sore head'? You might have heard your parents or teachers say it about you - or themselves - when you're being grumpy or painful ...

Well - then spare a thought for Tundra, the 360 kilogram Alaskan brown bear, who has had a tooth ache for the past few months that nothing was able to fix.

Tundra lives in a zoo in Minnesota in the United States - and last week - vets at the zoo pulled off a world first – putting the big fella under a giant amount of anaesthetic and getting him on the operating table to stick a bear-sized crown on his aching tooth.

A crown is a dental implant that sits over the top of a broken tooth and protects it.

And because Tundra is such a big strong fella - the crown was made of titanium - which is a super-strong metal - and silver in colour.

So now when he smiles, he looks like a twelve foot tall hairy bear rapper.

Respect.
