That's because Australia experienced an earthquake on Saturday morning ... and for the residents of the Sunshine Coast and Brisbane in Queensland, the 5.6 magnitude quake made the ground tremble for a few minutes.

It was only a small quake ... certainly nothing compared to the big ones that have happened in other parts of the world recently, but it was still enough to break a record, registering as the largest on-shore earthquake in Australia in fifty years.

Happily, there were no reports of significant damage, and no one was hurt - but seismologist - who are people who study the movement of the earth's tectonic plates - were nevertheless kept busy on Saturday morning, as houses shook, alarms started ringing and rail services were cancelled in the south east of the Sunshine State.

Why do earthquakes happen? I've stuck a link to an excellent Squiz Kids Shortcut on Earthquakes and Volcanoes in today's episode notes .. but in a nutshell .. our planet's surface is a bunch of enormous rocky plates, all pressed up against one another .. all

moving very very slowly in different directons .. and when they bump up against one another and get stuck and can't get past each other - the pressure builds to a point until it breaks, and the plates grind against one another into a new position. Hey presto, the grinding of the plates causes the ground to tremble. It's science, innit

And while there were lots of mishaps - lots of robots falling over one another, or REALLY slow and actually not that interesting games of soccer between robots - these are just the beginning of what science is going to be able to achieve.

In your lifetime - robots will be created that are capable of doing all sorts of things that humans do now - and creating and programming them will be a really important, and really interesting job for some of you.
