Each day we give the world globe a spin and find a news story from wherever it stops - and today we've landed in Venezuela ... a country that sits at the top of the continent of South America.

And the reason we've landed there is because that's the home country of this year's Nobel Peace Prize winner.

What's the Nobel Peace Prize? It's only one of the most famous, important prizes in the world - awarded to the person who has done the most to try to achieve peace or promote harmony in the world. Someone who - sometimes in the face of great personal danger - has what we call the 'courage of their convictions' to stand up to critics and opponents and try to make the world a better place.

And this year's winner - announced at the weekend - is Maria Corina Machado - the opposition leader of Venezuela - who was last year banned from running in the

presidential elections there despite being massively popular - because the man running the country does not want to give up power.

And while that might sound surprising: that happens around the world much more than you might think. Which means when you live in a democracy - like ours - where the people's vote is more powerful than any one individual - it's something never to be taken for granted.

It's been forty years since the Diamonds, Australian women's netball team, lost a game in Adelaide ... and yesterday afternoon they kept the record clean, beating South Africa and taking out a clean sweep in the international series.

The Aussies hang on to their world champion status beating the Proteas 65 goals to 42. Go Diamonds!

There was news from the NRL too - with the name of the Papua New Guinea team being revealed.

From 2028, the Papua New Guinea Chiefs will join the competition, with their home ground in the PNG capital of Port Moresby.

The team name Chiefs was announced yesterday by PNG's Prime Minister– as a nod to the many tribes that make up the country just to Australia's north.
