In Israel and Gaza on Monday night our time, families hugged loved ones they weren't sure they'd ever see again, after the final 20 living Israeli hostages and almost 2,000 Palestinian prisoners were freed as part of a new ceasefire deal. A ceasefire means the fighting pauses so people can move safely, aid can reach those who need it, and leaders can keep talking instead of shooting. It doesn't fix everything — but it gives people a moment to breathe, and to hope.

The ceasefire comes after more than 2 years of conflict between the country of Israel and the militant Palestinian organisation, Hamas.

The released hostages were taken to hospitals in Israel, while buses carrying freed Palestinian prisoners rolled into Gaza and the West Bank, where crowds cheered, waved flags, and reunited with family. But as the celebrations continued, many others were still searching through rubble, mourning loved ones, or trying to find food and shelter.

US President Donald Trump, who helped broker the deal, flew into Israel and declared, "the war is over." - His words. It's a bold statement — and one everyone's hoping might

come true. But for now, it's more of a wish than a promise. The ceasefire brings a precious pause, and maybe, a chance to end the conflict permanently.
