New rules are about to introduced on Roblox restricting kids under 17 from the communication features of the platform - which is to say, the ability to chat online. And there's a possibility that Roblox will still be included in the upcoming teen social media ban - preventing kids under 16 from using it all.

#### SPIN THE GLOBE

Each day we give the world globe a spin and find a news story from wherever it stops .. and today we've landed in England - where a dinosaur superhighway has been uncovered.

Palaeontologists - who are people who study fossils for a living - are doing cartwheels since the discovery of a trail of massive dinosaur footprints, believed to be over 160 million years old, and stretching out over 200 metres.

It's believed to be the longest trail of dino footprints ever discovered.

From the size of the footprints left behind, scientists reckon they belong to a bunch of Cetiosauruses - huge plant-eating dinosaurs about the size of a double decker bus.

The footprints were created as the massive creatures trudged through mud - which then got covered in millions of years of sediment and rock - until a controlled explosion in a quarry brought them back to the surface. Amazing ..
