But traditional owners of the national park want Old Faithful to stay in his water hole - arguing he has always lived in the wild, never hurt anyone and deserves to spend his

final years doing what crocs do - munching on wild barramundi and being an alpha male to all the other crocs.

It's a dilemma .. because rangers have to balance animal welfare with human safety. And, like sharks at the beach or dingoes on K'gari - another example of humans having to find ways to live peacefully alongside native animals in their natural habitat.

SPIN THE GLOBE

Each day we give the world globe a spin and find a news story from wherever it stops. And today we've landed in Mexico - or in the sea off the coast of Mexico, to be precise - where scientists have observed orcas munching on the livers of great white sharks.
