# THE LOWDOWN

What would you say if I told you we're jumping into a time machin and landing in icy Siberia (that enormous, icy region in the very north of Asia), 39,000 years ago? Snow swirling, wind howling, and a young woolly mammoth thundering across the frozen ground, being chased by cave lions (yep... they were a thing in the Ice Age). Scientists can't say all this for sure, but they've just uncovered clues that take us incredibly close to one young mammoth's final moments.

You've heard of DNA, right? The chemical code found in almost all your cells that makes you you? Well, there's another molecule called RNA... it reads the DNA instructions and helps each cell become what it needs to be: skin, muscle, nerve, heart... instead of everything being identical.

RNA is usually super fragile and breaks down within minutes, but in one young mammoth, nicknamed Yuka, it froze so fast after dying, that tiny pieces of this molecule survived for around 40,000 years.... The oldest ever found!

So, what does this tell us? At the time Yuka died, their muscles were pumping out the same chemical signals animals make when they're under stress. Coupled with the fact that the remains were pretty damaged, it seems like Yuka may have been under attack.

And that's why scientists are so excited... because frozen RNA might help unlock the everyday lives of Ice Age animals, not just their final chapters.

Every year, about 600 sheep march right through the city's market square on their way to their cosy winter paddocks. You see, in summertime, they live on grassy fields on one side of the city, munching away like fluffy lawnmowers. But when winter rolls in, their pastures are on the opposite side, and the fastest route from one to the other is straight through the middle.

So on Sunday, humans stood back as the bleating, bustling flock trotted over bridges and across streets on their 10-kilometre journey. Locals are encouraged to make space, keep dogs well back, and enjoy the show.

Why were some of Australia's biggest sporting names dressed up and celebrating in Melbourne on Monday night? They gathered together for the Sport Australia Hall of Fame Awards, and two massive champions walked away with the night's biggest prizes.

First up, Formula 1 driver Oscar Piastri scooped up The Don Award, named after cricket great Sir Donald Bradman. It's given to the athlete who has most inspired Australians, and Oscar's electric season, winning seven of the F1s first 15 races and leading the world championship earlier this year, definitely did that. He's the first-ever Formula 1 driver to win The Don.

Then there's surfing legend Layne Beachley, who took home The Dawn Award, named after Olympic swimming star Dawn Fraser. The Dawn celebrates people who show courage and change sports for the better. Layne has absolutely done both: She's battled injuries, pushed through tough early years (when she sometimes had to sleep in her surfboard bag!), and helped fight for equal pay and opportunities for women in surfing. Her impact has changed surfing forever.

Who knows... if you love your sport and work hard, it might be you up on that stage one day.
